




LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Proposing and passing legislation is a lengthy process that takes time and commitment to what you believe will make Pennsylvania laws stronger and better. It is humbling to introduce legislation that will greatly impact many in our commonwealth and I am proud to say that three of my bills (below) recently passed the House with bipartisan support and await consideration in the Senate. 


BIPARTISAN BUDGET COMPLETED

In early July, the legislature passed and Gov. Shapiro signed the state's annual budget into law. I voted in favor of this budget because it's a fair and balanced plan that prioritizes Pennsylvanians in every stage of life. We invested a historic \$1.3 billion in education with a 7.2% increase in special education, increased funding for students' mental health and physical safety, and provided money for menstrual hygiene products in school restrooms to help students focus on learning.

Further, this spending plan makes investments supporting:

- Pennsylvania seniors, by allotting for rate increases in Medicaid for nursing homes and home- and community-based services.
- Servicemembers, by allocating an additional \$14 million to the state Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs to provide services for veterans and their families.
- Those living with intellectual disabilities, by increasing the Community Waiver program by \$261 million.
- Public transit, by delivering a \$53 million boost to SEPTA.
- Working parents, by allotting an extra \$26.2 million in subsidized child care services and creating an employer child care tax credit – incentivizing Pennsylvania businesses to help cover their employees' child care costs.
- Student teachers, by providing \$20 million for stipends.
- Community revitalization efforts, by launching the \$20 million Main Street Matters program, under the Department of Community and Economic Development, which will provide grants to enhance local economies.



MILLIONS OF DOLLARS BROUGHT HOME

As your state representative, I have been working hard to ensure that our community gets its fair share of state funding. Here are some grants I've recently helped secure:

IMPROVING LOCAL TRAFFIC FLOW:

 Abington Township: \$442,480 for full modernization of the existing traffic signal in a problematic area.

LOCAL ARTS AND HISTORICAL ORGANIZATIONS:

- Abington Art Center: \$22,665.
- Holocaust Awareness Museum and Education Center: \$15.077.
- Storybook Musical Theater: \$10,000.

OUTDOOR RECREATION AND PRESERVATION:

- Willow Manor Drainage: \$300,000 from the Watershed Restoration Protection Program.
- Fort Washington Cross County Trail: \$125,000 from the Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program.

COMBATING SEXUAL VIOLENCE:

Manor College: \$39,799 "It's On Us" grant.

TRAFFIC AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IN SCHOOL ZONES:

• Upper Dublin Township: \$1.14 million.

SCHOOL SAFETY, SECURITY AND MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT SERVICES:

- Abington School District: \$248,788.
- Upper Dublin School District: \$195,325.
- · Saint Hilary of Poitiers: \$73,655.

VOTE ON (OR BEFORE) NOV. 5

Polls will be open from 7am to 8pm on Tuesday, Nov. 5. If you're in line by 8pm, you have the right to vote. I recommend confirming your polling place ahead of time by visiting pavoterservices.pa.gov.

You can also opt to utilize a mail-in ballot. The last day to request one is Oct. 29 at 5pm. Remember, you have to re-request to vote by mail each year you wish to do so.



The county election office must receive your mail-in ballot by 8pm on Nov. 5. Please note that a Nov. 5 postmark is NOT sufficient. You can also utilize one of the county's secure drop boxes, which will be available 24 hours a day, or hand-deliver it to the county elections office at One Montgomery Plaza, 425 Swede St. #602 in Norristown. Don't forget to sign and date your ballot.

PROPERTY TAX/RENT **REBATE EXTENDED**

To ensure as many Pennsylvanians receive the relief they are entitled to, the deadline for older adults and Pennsylvanians with disabilities to apply for rebates on rent and property taxes paid in 2023 has been extended to December 31.

This program provides a rebate ranging from \$380 to \$1,000 to eligible older adults and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The maximum household income is increased from previous years to \$45,000 for tax year 2023. Only half of the accrued Social Security dispersals count toward the \$45,000 cap. Application booklets are available at my office. We also offer in-person assistance in submitting the application; please call my office at (215) 517-6800 to set up an appointment.



It was an honor to be invited to the White House for the Safer States Legislative Convening. I was one of 60 legislators from across 30 states invited to participate in a discussion on gun safety policy accomplishments from the 2024 legislative session and to support each other's work ahead in advancing the Safer States Agenda next session. I am extremely humbled to be recognized by our federal government as a state legislative leader on gun violence prevention. It was truly an honor for President Biden and the White House staff to include me in this important conversation. It was a successful day connecting with my peers and colleagues from across the country and left me hopeful in our current and future efforts.








MY COMMITMENT TO LGBTQ+ PENNSYLVANIANS

It's my honor to advocate for equitable and inclusive policies that make Pennsylvania a better and more welcoming place for all.

In addition to introducing my LGBTQ+ Panic Defense legislation (HB637), I am committed to streamlining the legal name change process: I introduced three bills, with my co-sponsors, to simplify and support the legal name change process for Pennsylvanians – primarily, but not limited to, benefiting transgender, non-binary, and gender-expansive individuals.

- House Bill 610 would eliminate the costly and archaic requirement of publishing name change notifications in newspapers and seeks to seal court records to better protect privacy.
- House Bill 638 proposes the establishment of a grant program to provide financial support to organizations, counties, and local governments that assist transgender people with the legal name change process.
- House Bill 609 works to remove sex from birth certificates, a move recommended by the American Medical Association.
 Doing this would prevent many problems transgender individuals face by having an incorrect gender marker on this foundational document.

Together, these bills address the systemic challenges faced by transgender Pennsylvanians, ensuring they have access to the necessary support and documentation to live authentically without undue hardship.
