

The Soon-To-Be 165th Legislative District

Redistricting is a process that happens once every decade based on census results as required by the PA Constitution. This past March, the PA Supreme Court finalized the Legislative Reapportionment Commission's new state legislative maps. If you currently live in Media, Upper Providence, or Swarthmore, your district is changing this fall.

As a result of the new maps being approved, the 165th Legislative District (which I currently represent) will consist of Springfield, Upper Providence, Media, Morton, and Swarthmore, as well as part of Marple (Ward 4 division 2, Wards 5, 6, and 7). The new district will take effect once the current legislative session ends on Nov. 30, 2022. Your representative for the upcoming legislative session will be determined in the November General Election, but I want to make sure you are up to speed on these important changes and provide you with a glimpse of events and resources available to residents in the current 165th District.



2022-2023 Budget Passes in Harrisburg

This year's final \$45.2 billion budget plan makes historic investments in education, the environment, and mental health treatment while also saving money for the rainy-day fund and reserving revenue for next year.

Under this spending plan, Delaware County will receive 15.4% more education funding than last year. Funding has also been earmarked for mental health and school safety initiatives. Each school district gets \$100,000, plus \$15 per student, in both a physical safety grant and a mental health grant, totaling \$200,000 in student health and safety funding per district. The budget also provides a one-time increase to property tax and rent rebates under the state's Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program. Recipients will receive an additional one-time check that is equal to 70% of what they receive in this year's rebate. Recipients do not need to file an additional application. The Department of Revenue will add the supplemental amount and distribute it with the regular payment.

I am also proud to report that \$1 million will go to creating the Hunger Free Campus Initiative. This is a program I co-authored with state Rep. Malcolm Kenyatta (D, Philadelphia) in H.B. 1363 more than a year ago. This funding will be distributed to higher education institutions in the form of grants to create or expand food pantries and further address college food insecurity.

Some other highlights from the budget include:

- Annual funding for the newly established Delaware County Health Department with a maximum amount of \$3.1 million.
- Critical environmental investments ranging from \$7 million for the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, \$640 million in American Rescue Plan dollars invested in the Clean Streams Fund, State Parks & Outdoor Recreation Program including the creation of 3 new state parks, as well as Water and Sewer Projects.
- An increase of nearly \$425 million into the Motor Vehicle Fund for highway maintenance & safety improvements, driver & vehicle services, REAL ID, and local road maintenance & construction payments.
- A new tax credit called the Pennsylvania Dependent and Child Care Enhancement Program to support working families with children who need assistance with childcare and other costs.
- Reduction of the corporate net income tax from 9.99% to 4.99% gradually until 2031 to align PA with other states and attract more businesses to a competitive market.
- A deposit of \$2.1 billion into the rainy-day fund for a total balance of \$4.96 billion.

Are You Prepared to Vote This November?

The General Election is right around the corner, happening on Tuesday, Nov. 8. Unlike our closed primaries, this election is open to all of Pennsylvania's registered voters, so I wanted to ensure you have all the information you need to carry out your civic duty.

The last day to request a mail-in/absentee ballot is Tuesday, Nov.

OnlineAbsenteeBegin. If you'd prefer a paper application, my district office can provide you with one.

The county election office must receive all mail-in/absentee ballots by 8 p.m. on Nov. 8. Postmarks are not enough. Instead of mailing ballots back, voters may instead utilize a secure drop box or hand deliver their completed ballot to the county election office, located on the ground floor of the Delaware County Government Center, 201 W. Front Street in Media.



Scan to find a secure drop box near you. Information will be updated closer to Election Day.

Voting in person? Visit pavoterservices. pa.gov/Pages/PollingPlaceInfo.aspx to find your polling place. Polls will be open 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. on Election Day.

BRINGING ANOTHER \$2.5M HOME

Recently, I was happy to announce that Delaware County and organizations within were awarded \$2.5 million in grants to help create local apprenticeship programs, invest in electric vehicles and charging stations, and heighten safety measures at a local place of worship.

Funding has been awarded as follows:

- Beth El-Ner Tamid: \$20,000 from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency to strengthen the synagogue's safety and security measures.
- Delaware County: Two grants, both worth \$300,000, from the Alternative Fuels Incentive Grant program, to go toward electric vehicle usage. One grant helped purchase 69 electric cars for use by county departments, with 29 dedicated to the new health department for health care visits around the county. The second grant went toward the installation of 22 Level 2 dual-plug charging stations, for a total of 44 chargers.

The following grants were awarded through PAsmart and will provide regional employment and educational opportunities:

- BAYADA Home Health Care: \$650,000 to expand their home care nurse residency apprenticeship program across multiple counties and establish a nursing apprenticeship program.
- The Wistar Institute: \$649,551 to expand its biomedical research technician apprenticeship program.
- Arcadia University: \$632,258 to expand its early childhood education program to enroll and train 12 new registered apprentices with targeted recruiting of individuals from marginalized groups, such as people of color and socio-economically disadvantaged communities. This funding will also help provide academic supports such as laptops, financial support to mitigate housing/food insecurities, childcare costs, and scholarships.
- Apprentice Training for the Electrical Industry was awarded \$394,383 for a program introducing young women to the electrical trade. The program, "Rosie's Girls," is designed to familiarize young women with safety, tools, theoretical basics of electrical and telecommunications installation, and jobsite conditions, as well as an introduction to other career paths in the building and construction trades.

Abortion Still Legal in Pennsylvania But Constitutional Amendment Could End That

When the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, it ended a precedent set for the last 50 years. It's devastating news for women across the country. This decision doesn't just end legal abortion as a constitutional right in America, it puts the lives of women in jeopardy. It threatens to impact fertility treatment and reproductive health care, including miscarriage treatment and ectopic pregnancies. In fact, we are already hearing stories about providers' uncertainty on how to treat women around the country whose lives are in danger because of the legal rules in their state.

While abortion remains legal in Pennsylvania, the majority party in Harrisburg is already working to undermine this fundamental right in the state. During the final legislative days of the summer, they rushed through a constitutional amendment (S.B. 106), taking votes in the Senate after 11 p.m. on Thursday and the final vote in the House near 10:30 p.m. the next day. This constitutional

amendment includes provisions changing the way the state elects the Lieutenant Governor, adding voter suppression tactics, requiring post-election audits carried out by the state auditor general, and stopping regulations established by the executive branch. It was also amended with language that states, "This constitution does not grant the right to taxpayer-funded abortion or any other right relating to abortion."

This language was carefully selected so proponents can say it is simply about taxpayer funds, but the language "or any other right relating to abortion" was purposefully added because the first step to an outright ban is legal confirmation that there is no right to abortion. By amending the constitution, the General Assembly would hold this authority and prevent the courts from stepping in.

This is the first time that a constitutional amendment is being passed to *remove* rights from Pennsylvanians, not add to



or guarantee them. If S.B. 106 passes in the next full legislative session (beginning January 2023) it could then go on the ballot for voters to decide as early as the May 2023 Primary Election. If this issue is important to you, please be sure to follow updates related to S.B. 106.

In the meantime, I want to assure you that abortion currently remains legal in Pennsylvania. I also want to assure you that as each state is left to decide the fate of medical freedom for almost half of our country, please know I will do everything in my power to protect women and ensure our access to essential health care.

PA Property Tax/Rent Rebate Deadline Extended

The deadline to apply for the 2021 Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program for rebates on property taxes or rent paid has been extended to December 31.

This rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians 65 and older; widows and widowers 50 and older; and people with disabilities 18 and older. The state Department of Revenue is encouraging people to apply online by visiting mypath.pa.gov.

Good news for recipients! Included in this year's budget was an additional one-time bonus rebate for Pennsylvanians who receive a regular Property Tax/Rent Rebate.




This was made possible thanks to federal dollars Pennsylvania received from the federal government's American Rescue Plan.

This payment will equal 70% of what you receive in this year's rebate. This will come in the same form recipients elected to receive their original rebate. If you chose to receive your rebate via direct deposit, that is also how you'll receive the bonus rebate. No action is required.

Free Notary Services at My Springfield Office

Most official documents can be notarized for FREE at my office in Springfield. Please call ahead to make sure our notary is in and able to notarize your type of document prior to arriving.
