I've appreciated the opportunity to serve as your representative for the past year!

It's been a busy year, both in Harrisburg and in the 159th District.

Much of our time in Harrisburg was spent finalizing a 2017-18 state budget – which we did several months after the deadline. I'm happy that the final budget included a substantial increase in education funding and more funds for battling the opioid crisis.

But it didn't include measures such as a severance tax on natural gas drilling or a raise in the minimum wage – measures that would help secure the recurring revenue that Pennsylvania desperately needs to avoid having the same fight every year.

Later in the year, my House Democratic colleagues and I unveiled our Plan for PA, a comprehensive plan that puts people first, supports good jobs, fights for quality schools and promotes a fairer tax structure.

We want to put the needs of you, working families in Pennsylvania first. We want to ensure that our children receive a quality education no matter where they live and create more good jobs that pay family-sustaining wages.

Grant funds secured to combat gun violence

In early November, I announced that the City of Chester, along with other areas in Delaware County, will benefit from \$500,000 in state money to combat gun violence and expand the Delaware County Gun Violence Task Force.

Chester has recently been plagued with an increase in homicides, mostly due to gun violence, as reported by the Delaware County Office of the District Attorney. The district attorney's office has enforced sentencing illegal gun suppliers with a mandatory minimum of five to 10 years in prison.

I've supported the development of the Delaware County Gun Violence Task Force, which came together this year to combat area gun violence. Local council members, community leaders, members of the Delaware County Office of the District Attorney, Chester mayor's office and other law enforcement officials have met to discuss how to reduce the incidence of gun violence and the source of the crimes being committed.

The funds secured through this grant will be used to expand the anti-gun violence task force with the addition of special agents and independently funding other law enforcement personnel.

State funds to help renovate Washington Park

I was pleased to announce in November that the Chester Economic Development Authority was awarded a \$150,000 grant through the Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program to renovate Washington Park.

The grant comes from the Commonwealth Financing Authority, an independent agency of the Department of Community and Economic Development to administer Pennsylvania's economic stimulus packages.

Our residents, especially the youth and our seniors, enjoy the resources that Washington Park offers. These renovations will help support those activities, including our city's Summer Food Program and its operation.

Washington Park sustained damage to its playground equipment during a 2015 summer storm. Funds from the grant will aid in the installation of new playground equipment, sidewalks, benches and a shade structure for community use. According to the Chester Economic Development Authority, the total project cost is \$212,296.

Congratulations to the Chester Economic Development Authority for securing the funds for this important project!

Hosting family events in our community

As your representative, it's important to me to provide opportunities for our community members to gather, get to know one another and the first responders who serve our neighborhoods, and to connect people with the resources they might need.

That's why I held two events this year – June's Marcus Hook Family and Fun Day and September's Family and Friends Community Day in Chester – to do just that. These events offered fun and entertainment for families, plus a chance to learn about the services provided by my district office and other community organizations.

Grant to help with affordable housing project

In May, the Chester Economic
Development Authority was awarded a
\$99,800 Keystone Communities grant to
help with site preparation work associated
with the Arbor Homes affordable housing
project.

Administered by the Department of Community and Economic Development, the Keystone Communities program is designed to encourage the creation of partnerships between the public and private sectors in the community, supporting local initiatives that grow and stabilize neighborhoods and communities; ensure social and economic diversity; and enhance the overall quality of life for residents.

It's so important that our residents have access to affordable housing, and I am pleased that the Chester Economic Development Authority was able to secure this funding for the project.

Breaking ground for U.S.

I joined Gov. Tom Wolf and other officials in April for a groundbreaking on the expansion of U.S. 322.

According to PennDOT District 6, this location at the interchange of U.S. 322 and PA 452 is being improved as part of the U.S. 322 Section 102 project.

There are two mainline projects to rebuild, widen and improve 6.7 miles of U.S. 322 from U.S. 1 to just east of PA 452. The eastern section, from Featherbed Lane/Mattson Road to east of PA 452 is in final design and expected to move to construction in 2019. Construction on the western section (Featherbed Lane/Mattson Road to U.S. 1) is just beginning.



Visiting Penn Terminals with Gov. Wolf

In March, I enjoyed visiting Penn Terminals with Gov. Tom Wolf to highlight the state investment there. Penn Terminals and Crowley Maritime Corporation were commended for bringing more than 500 jobs and weekly container service to the ports of Greater Philadelphia, injecting millions into the local economy.

Creating more good jobs is part of the House Democrats' Plan for PA, and it's exciting to see state investment pay off.





Good news on REAL ID

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security granted Pennsylvania a REAL ID enforcement extension through Oct. 10, 2018.

That means that Pennsylvania residents won't face issues using their current IDs to access federal facilities or to board a plane for domestic travel through that date.

The federal REAL ID Act, passed in 2005, set minimum standards for driver's licenses and identification cards, in order for them to be accepted as identity documents by the federal government. Pennsylvania continues to work on REAL ID-compliant driver's licenses and anticipates that they will be available at the customer's option in March 2019.

Applications open for home heating financial aid



Temperatures have fallen, and the cold winter months have arrived, so it is a good time to think about whether you will need help heating your home.

LIHEAP, the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program, began accepting applications on Nov. 1. LIHEAP offers cash grants of \$200 to \$1,000 that are sent directly to the utility company to defray heating costs for eligible households, as well as crisis benefits of \$25 to \$500 for households in immediate danger of being without heat.

This season's income guidelines for both LIHEAP cash and crisis grants are \$18,090 for an individual, \$24,360 for couples and increases for each additional person in the household.

New anti-cruelty pet law includes cold weather protections

Act 10 of 2017, the overhaul of Pennsylvania's animal protection laws, took effect last year, and now is a good time to remember that it contains provisions related to the winter weather.

Under the new law, a dog cannot be tethered for longer than 30 minutes in temperatures below 32 degrees Fahrenheit. In the summer, the same restriction applies when it is 90 degrees or warmer.

Under the law, animals must be provided sanitary shelter that allows the animal to maintain normal body temperature and keeps the animal dry all year.

The law also provides dogs these commonsense protections:

- No more than nine hours tethered in 24-hour period;
- Tether must be the longer of three times the length of the dog or 10 feet;
- Must have water and shade;
- Must be secured by an appropriate collar during longer-term tethering – no tow or log chain, nor choke, pinch, prong, or chain collars;
- Tethered space must be clear of excessive waste; and
- No open sores or wounds.
