BURNS GETS STATE TO TAKE HEAVY-SOLED BOOTS AWAY FROM PRISONERS

When an inmate's Timberland boots contributed to the beating and kicking death of an SCI Somerset corrections officer in February, Rep. Burns was the first to call for immediate confiscation and a total ban on such footwear.

When the Department of Corrections at first only halted the sale of those boots, Rep. Burns stood with the correctional officers and swung into action, writing letters to the governor and the DOC secretary saying that solution didn't go far enough. Rep. Burns, who attended the funeral service for Sgt. Mark Baserman, demanded that in addition to suspending boot sales in prison commissaries, all boots already in prisoner possession be confiscated.

"I don't care if the inmates have to wear flip-flops, if it means saving a corrections officer's life." – Rep. Burns.

Eventually, the state relented to Rep. Burns' demands.

Dear Governor Wolf:

As Chairman of the Blue Lives Matter Caucus, I'm calling for an immediate and permanent ban on Timberland boots and other similar heavy-sole boots worn by inmates.

According to media reports, SCI-Somerset Corrections Officer Sgt. Mark Baserman was brutally attacked and later died after an inmate wearing Timberland boots kicked Baserman in the head, rendering him completely unresponsive. It's clear that the inmate used his boots as a weapon.

The State Department of Corrections announced yesterday that it has suspended the sale of heavy-sole work boots in prison commissaries, but hundreds of inmates still have them. We need to act NOW to get confiscate and destroy these boots, which pose such a deadly threat.

I stand with the state's prison guards, whose representative, Jason Bloom, told the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, "They have since stopped allowing [inmates] to order Timberland boots, but that doesn't do me a damn bit of good. I'm looking for a drop-dead date, mark them as contraband, destroy them, and get them out of the institution. They don't need to be there. It's not like they're going around doing heavy equipment work. They don't need these boots inside an institution."

I am also calling for a comprehensive review of the rules regarding inmate attire. I would like answers as to what footwear inmates are allowed to wear and when the rules were last revised.

Burns supports safety study for prison staff, corrections officers

Safe working conditions for those who work in our prisons – and who come face-to-face with some of the most dangerous characters in society – is a top priority for Rep. Burns.

Making sure Pennsylvania is doing all that it can to protect these brave workers is why Rep. Burns became an ardent and early sponsor of a resolution that directs the Joint State Government Commission to perform an important new study.

House Resolution 906 calls for a comprehensive study on the safety of staff and corrections officers in state prisons, and for those findings to be included in a report to the General Assembly.

Considering that the state Department of Corrections has a staff of 15,000 overseeing nearly 50,000 inmates, and that 801 inmate assaults on staff occurred in 2015, Rep. Burns believes it's prudent and necessary to put current policies under the microscope to look for improvement.

By closely examining all standards, practices, regulations and procedures, Rep. Burns thinks we can come up with better ways to protect staff and corrections officers.

Burns: \$341,661 awarded local fire, ambulance companies

Earlier this year, Rep. Burns announced the award of \$341,661 in state funds to 27 fire and ambulance companies in the 72nd Legislative District.

BUDGET: Not tax hikes or fee increases

Burns "no" vote prevented a tax increase in 2015 and proved there wasn't a need to raise taxes



An avowed fiscal conservative, Rep. Burns is pleased that Pennsylvania has a 2018-19 budget that was completed without any tax hikes or fee increases. This is something Rep. Burns has advocated for years.

Rep. Burns also pointed out that the new budget was even completed ahead of the June 30 deadline, a first in recent history. He was one of the many bipartisan supporters of the spending plan, which passed the House 188-10,

contains increases of \$100 million for basic education and \$70 million for school safety, and provides an additional \$30 million for vocational education.

"I've been saying for years" that we can pass a budget without hiking taxes or increasing fees. Finally, that message seems to have gotten through to everyone else." - Rep. Burns.

Rep. Burns noted that it wasn't too long ago that he was being strong-armed in attempt to raise taxes - and effort he resisted even when it meant being punished in Harrisburg for not falling in line. He believes now, as he did then, that by resisting higher taxes he is reflecting the will of the 72nd Legislative District.

Burns' resolution declares 'Law Day' in Pa.

The House unanimously adopted Rep. Burns' legislation that designated May 1 as "Law Day" in Pennsylvania, an effort with particular focus on the 14th Amendment that addresses U.S. citizenship and the rights of U.S. citizens.

Rep. Burns said that Law Day is observed by focusing on informing children from kindergarten through the college level. Judges and lawyers visit schools, educating students about their legal rights and responsibilities.

It is important to educate students at all levels about the legal system, so they have an understanding of their rights and responsibilities, Rep. Burns said.
