## More money in your pocket

The number of people struggling to get by is only growing, especially among our seniors.

For almost 20 years, many people lost access to the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program because of small changes in their income. Starting in 2024, a new law, which I voted for, will help an extra 10,000 renters and homeowners in Luzerne and Lackawanna counties to stay in the homes and communities they love. The expansion:

- √ Raises the income limit to qualify for rebates to \$45,000 for both homeowners and renters.
- ✓ Ensures this income cap will keep pace with inflation beginning in claim year 2024.
- ✓ Increases the maximum rebate from \$650 to \$1,000.

Remember, when calculating your yearly earnings, you need to claim ONLY half of your yearly Social Security allocation to qualify.

**REMINDER:** You have until December 31 using the current income limits to apply for a rebate on the property taxes or rent paid last year.

# \$7.9 million in state g

One of the most gratifying parts of my job as your state Representative in Harrisburg is seeing your tax dollars returned to our area through various state grant programs. Many of the projects funded by these grants would either not be possible for local governments to afford, or they would require local taxes to be increased.

Some of the grants awarded to our area so far this year include:

#### **Avoca Borough**

- \$440,781 to purchase a new emergency rescue truck.
- \$221,600 to renovate the Avoca Borough VFW building.
- \$130,000 to renovate the Avoca Borough Community Center.
- \$50,532 to purchase a new police cruiser.

#### **Dalton Borough**

- \$105,000 to purchase a backhoe for public works.
- \$38,427 to purchase police cameras and safety equipment.
- \$35,410 to purchase a public works vehicle.
- \$33,847 to purchase a Kubota diesel tractor for the public works department.

#### **Dupont Borough**

- \$100,000 to acquire and develop greenspace for the Dupont Public Park Enhancement Project.
- \$45,825 to restore Dupont Community Park with new equipment.
- \$100,000 to construct a maintenance garage.
- \$30,000 to upgrade information technology infrastructure.
- \$15,000 to construct a veterans memorial monument.

#### **Duryea Borough**

- \$114,045 to renovate Germania Hose Co.
- \$25,200 to expand the storage facility for the Duryea Wildcats Junior Football Association.

#### Glenburn Township

 \$130,000 for the Department of Public Works Building Phase I.

#### **Hughestown Borough**

- \$116,200 to build a new salt shed storage.
- \$123,704 to purchase a backhoe.

#### **Jenkins Township**

- \$103,140 to purchase two new police vehicles.
- \$67,910 to purchase firefighter turnout gear.
- \$365,000 to mill and pave Carey Lane and Centerpointe Drive.

#### Laflin Borough

- \$225,340 for stormwater improvements.
- \$77,103 to purchase a work truck for the Public Works Department.
- \$62,800 for updated signal equipment at Route 315 and Laflin Road (SR 2026).
- \$17,435 to rehabilitate 58 fire hydrants.

#### **Moosic Borough**

- \$135,139 to replace the roof at the Moosic Youth Center.

#### **Old Forge Borough**

- \$121,542 to renovate the fire station.
- \$100,000 to improve field lighting at Pagnotta Park.
- \$90,990 to purchase LED signage and other safety equipment to improve safety of residents and visitors.

### Nearly \$280,000 for local fire, EMS companies

Our first responders answer the call every day and go above and beyond to keep our communities safe. I am pleased to see local fire and emergency medical service companies receive essential grant funding so they can do everything necessary to protect us and provide emergency aid.

The funds can be used for facility upgrades, equipment, debt reduction, training and certification, education and public outreach, and recruitment and retention efforts.

PennDOT also announced a large \$1.8 million grant to help fund the development of a 138-acre business park — CenterPoint Commerce & Trade Park South — including a signal intersection, turning lanes, internal roadways, SR 2004 access road, road widening and a bus transit shelter.

### My bill to remember 9/11 passes House

I am proud to report that the House of Representatives unanimously passed my bill that would require schools to observe a moment of silence to annually recognize September 11, 2001.

My bill (H.B. 1097) would ensure that future generations of Pennsylvanians understand the events of 9/11, as well as the impact that day continues to have on the lives of all Americans. It would direct the Department of Education to identify model curriculum that would inform school students about the significance of 9/11 and why they should never forget the events of, or the lives lost, that day. The teaching of the curriculum would be optional for each school.

The tragedies that occurred on September 11, 2001, changed our country forever. It is 22 years later, and we are still studying and analyzing the effect that day had on our foreign policy, national security, society and our values.





# PACE/PACENET prescription assistance for seniors

Pennsylvania's prescription assistance programs for older adults, PACE and PACENET, offer low-cost prescription medication to qualified residents, age 65 or older. The program works with Medicare Part D plans and other prescription drug plans such as retiree/union coverage, employer plans, Medicare Advantage (HMO, PPO) and veterans' benefits (VA) to lower out-of-pocket costs for medications.

- PACE and PACENET eligibility is determined by your previous calendar year's income.
- You must be 65 years of age or older.
- A Pennsylvania resident for at least 90 days before the application date.
- You cannot be enrolled in the Department of Human Service's Medicaid prescription benefit.

**PACE Income Limits:** for a single person, total income must be \$14,500 or less; \$17,700 for a married couple.

**PACENET Income Limits:** for a single person, total income can be between \$14,500-\$33,500; \$17,700-\$41,500 for a married couple.
